### THE ARTISTS

Ellyn L. Peabody, soprano, appeared with Redwood Symphony last season in its performance of Mahler's Second Symphony. Upcoming engagements include performances with Pocket Opera's productions of *The Secret Marriage* and *The Marriage of Figaro*, and she recently appeared in their concert version performance of Handel's *Ariodante*. Miss Peabody was heard as Mimi in Amador Valley Opera Theater's *La Boheme*, and as Fiordiligi in Berkeley Opera's *Cosi Fan Tutte*. She holds degrees from the Peabody Conservatory of Music in Baltimore and was an apprentice with the Wolf Trap Opera Company.

Mezzo soprano Marcia Gronewold returns to sing with Redwood Symphony following her performances in Mahler's Das Lied von der Erde in March and his Second Symphony last season. Her recent appearances have included the role of Cherubino in The Marriage of Figaro with Amador Valley Opera Theater and the title role in Stravinsky's Persephone with Berkeley Symphony. Other operatic roles she has sung include Suzuki in Madame Butterfly with West Bay Opera, and Dame Quickly in Vaughan William's Sir John in Love with Berkeley Opera. She sang the role of Mary Fleming in the premiere performances of Thea Musgrave's Mary, Queen of Scots under the composer's baton with Spring Opera Theater. Her oratorio credits include Handel's Messiah with the Sacramento Symphony, Beethoven's Ninth Symphony with the Santa

Symphony, and Cruz County Mendelssohn's Oratorio with the Bay Area Women's Philharmonic. An active recitalist and chamber music performer, she has sung at the Festival at Sandpoint and on concert series including Performances at Six, Old First Concerts, and Old St. Mary's Noontime Concerts. Miss Gronewold has sung premiere performances of numerous new works, as mezzo soprano soloist with the contemporary vocal ensemble Ariel and with the Berkeley Contemporary Chamber Players, the Composers Chamber Players, and the San Francisco Contemporary Music Players. In 1989 she sang Shoenberg's Pierrot Lunaire and Ravel's Trois chansons de Stephane Mallarme with an ensemble of Redwood Symphony players under the direction of Eric Kujawsky. A native of Illinois, Miss Gronewold received training in music and drama at University of Illinois. She holds degrees from San Francisco State University and the San Francisco Conservatory of Music.

William Roberts is one of the few heldentenors of our day. Having sung both lyric tenor and baritone roles earlier in his career, Mr. Roberts's voice has been likened to that of Lauritz Melchior. He has studied with Jess Thomas, one of the most renowned heldentenors of all time. While studying with Thomas in 1986, Mr. Roberts was featured as Siegmund in Thomas's studio presentation of excerpts from Wagner's Die Walküre. In 1985 Mr. Roberts was contracted

to sing tenor in the San Francisco Opera's presentation of Wagner's Ring. However, Mr. Roberts's first opera performance in California was as a baritone in the role of King Melchior in Amahl and the Night Visitors in 1982. In 1983 he performed the role of Georgio Germont in La Traviata, and the role of Tonio in I Pagliacci in 1984. In the latter performance he was described in the San Francisco Chronicle/Examiner as "possessing a warm and powerful voice." Previously, Mr. Roberts performed the leading lyric tenor roles of Manrico in Il Trovatore, the Duke in Rigoletto, and Faust in Faust with the Fort Wayne, Indiana, Philharmonic Opera Company under the direction of Carolyn Lockwood of the Santa Fe Opera. In a previous season, Mr. Roberts sang the role of Rodolpho in La Bohéme under the stage direction of the late Frank St. Ledger, whose background included working with that opera's composer, Giacomo Puccini. Also in Fort Wayne, Mr. Roberts was soloist with the Fort Wayne Philharmonic Orchestra. As business manager of that orchestra, he produced and narrated three radio broadcasts each week called "Adventures in the Arts."

Baritone Michael Morris has performed over fifty leading roles in opera, operetta and musical theater. Mr. Morris's opera credits include Germont in La Traviata, Figaro in The Marriage of Figaro, Bartolo in The Barber of Seville, Dr. Malatesta in Don Pasquale, Alfio in Cavalleria Rusticana, Escamillo in Carmen, and Marcello and Schaunard in La Bohéme, with such companies as the West Bay Opera, Opera San Jose, Rogue Valley (Oregon) Opera, and Yosemite Valley Musicians Holidays. In the summer of 1989 Mr. Morris spent three months in Austria and Germany where he studied at the American Institute of Musical Studies (AIMS), and auditioned for German agents and opera houses. He toured northern Italy with the AIMS Orchestra. Mr. Morris has also soloed with the San Jose Symphonic Choir, Oakland Symphony Chorus, Santa Clara Chorale, San Mateo Symphony and Fremont-Newark Philharmonic. Among Mr. Morris's musical theater credits are Don Quixote in Man of La Mancha, Emile De Beque in South Pacific, and El Gallo in The Fantasticks. Mr. Morris is also well-known as a voice teacher and music director in the Bay Area. He is currently on the music faculty at the College of Notre Dame, and serves as the Music Director

of the Los Altos Conservatory Theater.

The Peninsula Master Chorale, this year celebrating its twentieth anniversary season, was founded in 1970 by current Music Director Carl Sitton. The select fifty-voice choir is sponsored by Cañada College of the San Mateo County Community College District. In addition to regular Bay Area performances, the critically acclaimed chorale has completed four international tours: two to Europe, one of Australia and New Zealand, where they appeared at Expo 88, and one to Japan, where they performed on Japanese television.

Carl Sitton is known widely in the United States as a choral conductor and composer. A student of the French composer Darius Milhaud, his publications include both sacred and secular choral compositions. He is currently head of the voice and choral departments at Cañada College, a position he has held since 1968. He is past-president of the San Francisco Bay Area chapter of the National Association of Teachers of Singing, and he has appeared as a conductor at the national convention of the American Choral Directors Association. His biography appears in Who's Who in the West, Who's Who in American Education and Who's Who in Entertainment.

Eric Kujawsky is an instructor at Cañada College and teaches vocal and instrumental music at James Lick High School in San Jose. A native of Los Angeles, he began his conducting studies at age fourteen and made his debut at nineteen. After completing his B.A. in Music Education and M.F.A. in Conducting at UCLA, Kujawsky accepted a fellowship to study conducting at Stanford. Dr. Kujawsky founded Redwood Symphony in 1985, immediately after he received his D.M.A. in Conducting. Dr. Kujawsky has performed at the Aspen Music Festival as a member of the Conducting Master Class; his teachers have included Samuel Krachmalnick, Paul Vermel and Andor Toth. He is winner of the 1987 Bay Area Theater Critics' Circle Award and the Hollywood DramaLogue Award for his musical direction of Sondheim's Sunday in the Park with George with TheatreWorks in Palo Alto. Dr. Kujawsky has appeared as guest conductor with the South Valley Symphony, Diablo Symphony and UCLA Dance Company. He considers the high points in his life to be his marriage to Valerie Sarfaty and the birth of his son, Aaron Benjamin Sarfaty, in June of 1990.
