How Can I Keep From Singing?

As Peninsula Cantare sings its last concert of 1999, we present to you a sampling of inspired and inspiring choral music, some classics and a few 20th century pieces which may become classics. Mozart's "Solemn Vespers" is represented by two selections, one of strength and confidence and one of sublime beauty. Handel's "Music, Spread Thy Voice Around" is taken from his Oratorio Solomon and is a flowing, harmonious statement of this thought. From Haydn's Creation comes a wonderful soprano and bass duet with choir, expressing the wonders of this world and leading into a joyous choral proclamation.



"How Lovely is Thy Dwelling Place" from the Brahms Requiem is surely one of the great choruses of all time. What an inspired blending of music and text! A concert with this theme would not be complete without this marvelous excerpt. Jacob Handl gave us the familiar Christmas hymn, Resonet in Laudibus and Z. Randall Stroope, a contemporary American composer and conductor, arranges his lively setting based on the Handl tune.

The diversity of the 20th century is represented by two versions of Walt Whitman's text, A Jubilant Song – one of rhythmic exuberance and stark harmonies by Norman Dello Joio, and another of ecstatic joy by René Clausen. A small hymn of praise describes the Fauré "Cantique de Jean Racine" – what concise and elegant beauty is heard in these few moments of music! The women of Cantare share a poem by Emily Dickinson, written in an expansive and distinctly American style. "Dona Nobis Pacem" is a portion of the Mass text which translated means, Grant us Peace. This setting, however, is not peaceful, and seems to reflect the turmoil and tension in the world by imitating clanging and dissonant bells. "Sing Me to Heaven" by Daniel Gawthrop is an intimate and beautiful jewel, and Copland's "Promise of Living" is full of enthusiasm and optimism. Our closing piece, "How Can I Keep from Singing," was the stimulus for this program: a simple but meaningful hymn tune and the reason we are here tonight.

Janice Gunderson was named Director of Peninsula Cantare in January 1997. She has been an active musician in the Bay Area working as a professional accompanist, director, and teacher. From 1985 to 1997 she served as Assistant Conductor for the Masterworks Chorale under Galen Marshall. She was Choir Director and Organist at the First Baptist Church of San Carlos, and currently is accompanist at the College of Notre Dame and Canada College. She participated in the Festival of Masses with Robert Shaw and the Cabrillo Music Festival with Dennis Russell Davies. Janice studied at Lewis & Clark College and holds a degree form the University of Oregon with additional work at Cal State Hayward and San Jose State. Her professional affiliations include the Music Teachers Association and the American Choral Directors Association.

Danielle Munsell, a native of Washington State, recently completed a Master's degree in Vocal Performance at the University of Colorado at Boulder (CU). A versatile performer in both opera and musical theater, she has sung the roles of Lauretta (Gianni Schicchi), Susanna (Marriage of Figaro), Mary Todd Lincoln and Caroline (Alabama Serenade), Little Red Riding Hood, Ado Annie (Oklahoma!) and Magnolia (Showboat). In concert, Ms. Munsell has appeared in Washington, Colorado and California performing works such as Handel's Messiah, Orff's Carmina Burana, Stravinsky's Les Noces, and Steve Reich's Tehillim. For three seasons, Ms. Munsell has been a featured soloist at the Boulder Bach Festival. As a recitalist, she has presented both traditional and non-traditional programs, including an evening of lullabies in folk song and art song. She has appeared in masterclasses with Elly Ameling, Frederica von Stade, and Martin Isepp. This year, Ms. Munsell was privileged to sing in the prestigious William Naumberg International Vocal Competition. Locally, she performs with the San Francisco Concert Chorale and the American Bach Soloists.

Alexander Bootzin holds a B.A. degree in piano performance and an M.A. degree in Musicology from U. C. Santa Barbara. He performs as solo pianist and in chamber music concerts throughout the Bay Area and is active as a teacher, accompanist and musical director. He is currently Director of Music Ministries at Hope Lutheran Church in San Mateo and along with his wife Martha, runs the Spindrift School of Performing Arts in Pacifica.
